Institutional Membership

Institutions may participate as Observers and are invited to send representatives to the Annual Conference and General Assembly. They may put forward individuals as Members of Project Teams or Advisory Committees. Institutonal Observers and their Members are also welcome to suggest Project ideas to the Council and are invited to participate in SIGs.

Membership Fees

The annual fees vary depending on the type of membership:

Category	Minimum Annual Fee
Fellows and Individual Observers	60 Euros
Independent, Non-Profit Organisations	from 250 Euros*
Business or Advocacy Groups	from 500 Euros*
Law Firms	500/1,000/2,000/4,000 Euros*
